In 1985, Sam moved to Marietta to join the Institute Of Nuclear Power Operations, a non-profit organization formed by the nation's nuclear utilities as the industry's response to the Three Mile Island Accident. INPO's mission is to promote the highest levels of safety and reliability – to promote excellence – in the operation

U.S. Naval Academy Graduate and Nuclear Expert Topic: Three Mile Island Cleanup

Sam graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1968 with a Bachelor of Science degree and from the United States Naval Postgraduate School in 1969 with a Master's degree in management.

He then entered the Navy's Nuclear Power program, completing Nuclear Power School in Bainbridge, MD and Nuclear Power Prototype Training in West Milton, NY. Following submarine school, Sam was assigned to the USS Nautilus (SSN 571), homeported in New London, CT., in which he served as a division officer and department head from 1971 to 1974. Following a tour as a Company Officer at the Naval Academy from 1974 to 1976, upon completion of the Submarine Officer Advanced Course, Sam was assigned as the Engineer Officer aboard USS Cavalla (SSN 684) from 1976 to 1980. While on board Cavalla, he completed qualification for command in submarines. He left active duty in 1980 and affiliated with the reserves for twelve years. During this time, Sam served as the Commanding Officer of units supporting USS California (CGN 36), USS Yellowstone (AD 41), and Submarine Support Facility New London, as well as a staff assignment in a unit supporting the joint staff of the Commander in Chief, US European Command. Sam retired from the reserves in 1992 with the rank of Captain.

After leaving active duty, Sam was employed by the General Public Utilities Nuclear Corporation at the Three Mile Island Nuclear Generating Station in the aftermath of the accident at Unit 2. He managed various aspects of training before becoming the training manager in 1983. of commercial nuclear power plants. At INPO Sam served as a manager of the Emergency P r e p a r e d n e s s Department, the Events Analysis Department, and the Accreditation Department; as deputy

director of the Plant Evaluation Division, and as Director of the Plant Information Center. He also served as an Accreditation Team Manager and management representative and Plant Evaluation Team Manager and Exit Representative. In the latter position, he represented INPO's CEO in presenting results of plant evaluations to utility CEOs. Sam also was seconded to the World Association of Nuclear Operators, Atlanta Center, where he served as manager of the Performance Improvement Department. Sam also served a reverse loan assignment as the Vice President of Operations for the Vermont Yankee Nuclear Power Corporation. He retired from INPO in 2011.

Since retiring Sam has done some consulting work in the nuclear industry, but he spends much of his time on the golf course or, with his wife Sandy, traveling around the country volunteering at major golf tournaments. Sam and Sandy reside in Marietta. They have four children, including two Naval Academy graduates (91) and (94) and two UGA graduates. They have seven grandchildren, one of whom is a 1/c at the United States Air Force Academy.

MUST Ministries' kitchen was potentially sweltering both inside and outside last Thursday as the temperature climbed to plus 92 degrees; however, the committed Marietta Rotary team of Chef **Harold Hobbs**, **Doug Haynie**, **John Knox**, **Lewis Lipsius**, **Jim Trapnell**, and **Marlys Williams** prepared and served lunch to a record-breaking number of 110 diners at the Elizabeth Kitchen facility. The MUST organization had alerted the Rotary team that the number of attendees for the week had been running from 100-120 daily for lunch, surpassing the customary 70-80 diners for this time of year. The diners are consistently very thankful to partake of a delicious, nutritious meal in an air-conditioned dining facility.

From Chef Harold's repertoire of menus to serve 100+ within a two-hour deadline, Tex-Mex Chicken Casserole was made ready. The dish comprised of 12 one-pound packages of thin spaghetti cooked al dente, 9 one-half gallon cans of chicken breasts, 16 cans cream of mushroom soup, 12 packages of dry taco seasoning mix, a 5 lb. container of sour cream, 8 quart jars of medium salsa, topped off with

5 lbs. of sharp cheddar cheese. Accompanying this entrée were assorted breads, tossed salad, and fruit cocktail.
